Kim's Game



It's time for the party games at the Cat Queen's Midnight Feast...

You will need:

- a tray
- a cloth large enough to cover the tray
- about 8 to 10 different party objects (balloons of different colours, party plates, napkins, cups, little biscuits, crisps etc.)

Instructions:

- 1. Before the lesson, place the small objects on the tray and cover with the cloth.
- 2. Seat children so that they can all see the covered tray and then take off the cloth.
- 3. Ask them to look really carefully at the objects. Challenge them to try and remember all of them!
- 4. Recover the tray and, without children seeing, remove one object.
- 5. Remove the cloth once more and ask them to try and spot which object has been removed.
- 6. Take suggestions and reveal the object.
- 7. Ask children to consider adjectives that would work well to describe the object (a red cup, a cheesy biscuit etc.)
- 8. Extend to two adjectives (a sweet, pink biscuit etc.)
- 9. Repeat for the remaining objects!

Adjectives in Order

When you use several adjectives in the same sentence there is a rule about the order you have to write them in.

It goes...

SIZE before AGE before SHAPE before COLOUR, then the NOUN

If you get the adjectives the wrong way round it sounds funny.

The big green hat YES! The green big hat NO!

A young tiny girl **NO!** A tiny young girl **YES!**

Read these lines and see if the order of the adjectives is correct. If it is not, what re-ordering do you need to do?

The brown tall dog

The Cat Queen's huge old white tablecloth
